brilliant aurora was observ ) June 17.—A observed early brilliant aurora was observed early today at the Lowell Observatory. The northern horizon was peculiarly bright and ruddy at midnight. Although it lost color for a time it continued abnormally bright for several hours when the characteristic greenish-yellow auroral rays rapidly developed. The phenomenon extended from 25 deg. west to 45 deg. east of north along and upward from the horizon.

The display reached its greatest splendor a few minutes after the columnar rays first appeared and continued visible until dawn. The rays swing rapidly eastward, reaching upward generally to a height of 20 to 30 deg. The longest reached almost to the zenith.

Although common in northern latitudes, it is exceptional to see an aurora this far south, in latitude 35 deg. It is doubtless explained by an unusual encounter between the earth and a strong stream of radiant matter from the sun. Observations of this remarkable aurora will prove of great scientific interest. The doors were battered down and the crowd rushed to the fourth floor, where strong arms lifted up about twenty planos to the windows and dropped them into the street. When the loft was cleared out they hurrled on to other shops to continue the destruction.

"After my experience in Milan I

"After my experience in Milan I was a nervous wreck," said Miss Partington. "It was dreadful to witness such destruction, and the fearful yelling of the mob, I shail never forget. I managed to escape finally, but when I reached my hotel I fainted." ACQUITTED AND INDICTED.
