AURORA PARALYZES WIRES

Telegraphic Lines and Cables Over Large Area Affected by Magnetic Storm

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (A)-A magnetic storm of unusual intensity swept over the Northeastern United States and Canada today, going on one of its worst rampages in many months, Aurora Borealis, maker of celestial fireworks that frequently light up the arctic night, caused earth currents that stopped the operation of telegraph and cable wires entirely for a period this afternoon and throughout the day crippled both land and cables services.

Slow transmission of market transactions between Wall street and London was caused by the magnetic disturbances this morning, but by the time the height of the disturbance was reached this afternoon most of the trans-Atlantic market transmissions had been completed.

Telegraph experts reported that the disturbance apparently did not disturbance apparently did not go south or west beyond New York, but the fact that wires in this locality were paralyzed at different periods during the day affected messages going to and from all sections of the country and to foreign countries. For a while this afternoon nearly every wire in the New York offices of the Associated Press was "dead." In Canada, the Canadian Press and Telegraph companies likewise found their wires seriously affected by the disseriously affected by the turbances.

Efforts were made by telegraph experts to work adjustments to meet the frequent changes in earth currents, but aurora borealls worked too fast for human hands.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN REGION ALSO AFFECTED BY AURORA

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 15. (P)—Magnetic earth currents which crippled wire service in the East today also caused trouble in the West.

The Rocky Mountain region was most affected, news and commercial wires in Colorado. Wyoming, Montana, New Mexico and Arizona being put out of commission at intervals. On the Kansas City-San Frencisco trunk lines of the Associated Press intermittent interruptions occurred during the morning, the peak of the

intermittent interruptions occurred during the morning, the peak of the disturbance coming between noon and 2 p.m., central time.

As usual during magnetic storms, wires stretching east and west were hardest hit. No appreciable trouble was experienced up and down the Pacific Coast. At San Francisco the phenomenon was barely perceptible. Telegraph and telephone company officials here reported serious delays on all circuits to the Atlantic Coast. No difficulty was experienced to the south in Oklahoma and Texas, however.
